New Year 2017

Readings: Eph 2:1-11 and Jn 14:27-31

As we move toward our future with God, we struggle to be faithful to what was handed on to us from the past. We cannot do this on our own. We need the vision of those who stood closest to Jesus. We need the Spirit to guide and direct our decisions and judgments. We need the entire people of God: priests and lay people alike to work to bring about God's reign. With Christ in our midst, we have a light to guide us on our way.

Jesus promised to dwell forever with those who live in love and fidelity to his word, but he did not leave a blueprint as to how this would be done. Though he is removed from our sight, we must not be distressed. We are at peace, for we have another "Advocate, the Holy Spirit" (Jn 14:26a), whom God has sent in Christ's name. The Spirit will teach us everything and remind us of all that Christ has said. When we struggle to comprehend the lessons of the past, we can say with the apostles, "It has seemed good to the Holy Spirit and to us" (Acts 15:28a). Led by the Spirit, we will continue to celebrate the living Christ among us.

New Year Resolutions

New Year's Day is the time for resolutions. It's the time when we resolve to make changes so that things will not be as they were before. So, in this tradition, I would like to suggest three resolutions for a happy and blessed New Year. I call them "Pull back," "Pick up," and "Put down."

First: Pull back.

Dr. Gerald Jampolsky wrote a book a few years ago entitled, *Love Is Letting Go of Fear*. In that book he asks this question: "Have you ever given yourself the opportunity of going through just one day concentrating on totally accepting everyone and making no judgments?" He goes on to say, "Everything we think or say reacts on us like a boomerang. When we send out judgment, in the form of criticism, fury, or other attack-thoughts, they come back to us. When we send out only love, it comes back to us."

So I suggest this. Try this once a month: for one day, suspend all judgments. Spend one day of acceptance. Pull back from judging, and just look and accept. See the difference it makes in your life. Pull back.

Second: Pick up.

Pick up on what others have started. Some of you have known losses. You've lost spouses, you've lost children, you've lost relationships, you've lost health, you've lost equilibrium. You name it -there are losses scattered all over the landscape. But you have your choice about these losses. Your choice is either to turn in on yourself and forever cry "woe is me," or you can pick up on those who turn tragedy into discipleship. Remember the story of a little Japanese girl who was one of those kids who was caught in the bombing of Hiroshima, and who saw her mother and father and her family destroyed before her; and she herself had severe radiation burns.

She was in a hospital, fundamentally waiting to die, and she knew she didn't have long. But instead of bemoaning the tragedy, she said: "This can never happen again to people. People can't be this cruel to one another. So each day I'm going to cut out and make a white crane, and I'm going to send it to somebody and ask them to be a disciple for peace." Well, she did that every day for 683 days and then she died. And those who knew this little girl had their choice. They could be so outraged over the bombings that they'd be consumed by a desire to go out and bomb the rest of the world in revenge, or they could pick up on what she started, and they did. And so they made a 684th white crane, and a 685th, and so on ad infinitum, and those white cranes still go throughout the world saying that life can be better.

Instead of getting angry and blowing up the world, do something to make life better: say "no" to drugs, say "no" to sexual promiscuity. Instead of only being angry at drunk drivers, join M.A.D.D., Mothers Against Drunk Driving. There are homeless people to house, there are hungry people to feed. There are cranes to be cut out and sent. It's a good resolution, isn't it? Pick up on what others have done. Continue the decent people's love and spirit which will turn the world around.

Third: Put down.

Put down last year's garbage. A woman relates this story: I was telling my new workplace friend, Alice, about how awful my former boss had been, when she laughed and said, "So forget him. Why not just enjoy it here?" Then she went on to tell me a little story about herself.

I'm reminded of the time I moved a few years ago, she began. I was making enough money to have a professional mover pack for me, and when he asked what I wanted him to pack, I just waved my arm and said "Everything!" So when I got to my new place, I saw that he had taken me literally. Along with my furniture he had packed up all my trash bins as well, and there I was in my beautiful new place with all my old garbage, including old newspapers, empty ketchup bottles, and grapefruit peels!

It's a little story, all right, but it packs a big meaning. You have a beautiful New Year ahead of you. Leave the emotional garbage behind.

So, there you are. Three succinct New Year's resolutions: Pull back. Pick up. Put down. Pull back from judgment. Pick up on the positive. Put down the emotional garbage. That should make for a Happy New Year.

New Year: Prayer for peace

O Lord, the God of peace, You who have created men and shown them Your benevolence, so that they might share as sons in Your glory, we bless You and we give You thanks, because You have sent us Jesus, Your well-beloved Son, and, through the mystery of His resurrection, You have made Him the worker of all salvation, the source of all peace, the bond of all brotherhood.

We give You thanks for the desires, the efforts, the achievements stirred up by Your spirit of peace in our time, to replace hate by love, mistrust by understanding, indifference by reliance on each other. Open our minds and our hearts ever wider to the real demands of the love of all our brothers so that we may become peacemakers more completely. Remember, O Father of mercy, all those who struggle, suffer and die, to bring forth a world of closer brotherhood. May Your kingdom of justice, of peace and of love, come to men of every race and every tongue and may the earth be filled with Your glory. Amen. (Pope Paul VI)

Reflections: Every Time a Bell Rings

Sometimes bells ring loudly and clearly, while at other times they ring softly and delicately. Do you stop to listen to the innuendos, or do the sounds of bells become an accepted background for living?

As I sat in my sunroom on a beautiful, frosty morning enjoying the peace, my solar chimes began to ring, reminding me that the sun was shining. I felt happy and thought about the importance of bells through the ages and their meaning to us now as they bring joy and inspiration to our lives.

Before the common person could read or write, people relied on village bells to convey important messages. They were signals to those working in the fields that it was time to eat or end their day's work. Vendors used bells to announce their arrival in towns to sell their wares, and bells also called children to school. In some rural areas, bells are still attached to animals' necks by herders so that those who stray can be found.

Bells remind us of time and of those things that are timeless, universal, and eternal. Clocks chime the hours of the day. Alarm clocks jar us from a good night's sleep, telling us to wake up and greet the new day with optimism. Doorbells can be exciting sounds as we greet family and friends. Dinner bells remind us that it's time to gather for refreshment and to count our many blessings.

Bells call us to worship and toll when someone dies. Wind chimes remind us to pay attention to the air around us that is the breath of life. The Liberty Bell is a reminder to cherish our precious freedom. Singing bowls from Tibet can be a call to meditate and attune to the great vibrations of the universe. Bell choirs bring joy to the spirit through the eternal medium of music.

Perhaps the most important message of the bell is that it is asking us if we know what time it is. Are we in the morning, noon, or evening of our lives? We can be truly alive and excited and look forward to making the most of each new day.

In the movie *It's a Wonderful Life*, when a tiny bell on the Christmas tree rings, the little girl tells her father, "Teacher says that every time a bell rings, an angel gets his wings."

Listen to the pulsating bell in your heart that awakens the angel in each of us. Spread your wings, and let your spirit ring!
