Epiphany: 2nd Sunday of Epiphany

Readings: 2Cor 4:5-15 and Jn 1:35-42

It all begins with the good news. Good news, at the origin of Christianity that may seem obvious. And yet ... How do we represent our faith to ourselves? Is it not often, rather like other great religions, as a complex of beliefs, a system of spiritual and moral performances, inherited from those who were its initiators, who in their turn received them from God and transmitted them infallibly to the Church?

Recalling his childhood lived in a traditional Christian setting, Sartre speaks of this heritage of 'truths' as a collection of certitudes in a society which had experienced no cultural rupture with its past: 'They belonged to all, but no one needed to lay hold of them for himself; it was the common patrimony'. Is this what we mean by good news?

At the origin of Christianity there is no heavenly indoctrination; the religious consciousness's was not seeded with divine truths coming from the First Truth. It is by a decisive event, a coming, a Word which is Jesus Christ that the faith begins and spreads. The good news of God is his Son Jesus, and he can say: 'The kingdom of God is here' because he himself is here. In him and by him, God inaugurates his kingdom by actively saving humanity.

In this regard, the first 'fisher of men' is Jesus himself. He does not draw men with vinegar, but rather by announcing to them that everything in the Christian mystery is good news. If one may speak in such away, it is the sweet savor of the Christian tenets: the sacraments, the beatitudes, the Church, the forgiveness of sin, so many good tidings which are summed up in the person of Jesus, savior and revealer of a Father full of tenderness. To embrace this conviction, to follow Jesus unconditionally: that is what faith and conversion mean. And this is the exact opposite of a heritage of 'truths' which no one will need to 'lay hold of for himself' since they do not commit him to anything.
