Epiphany: Sunday of the Prodigal son

Readings: 2Cor 13:5-13 and Lk 15:11-32

INTRODUCTION:

The story of the prodigal son is that of many young men and women who have left God and His Church. Some, like him, had the courage to come back; some, unfortunately, did not show up again in the Father's house. But God, our Father, loved them all and expected their returning home. How should we understand the three persons of the parable?

1-THE PRODIGAL SON:

He was a young growing man but weary at home. He was third in the family if we count his father and his older brother. He felt acutely an outsider and not much favored. He was looking for total freedom and independence from his family. Instead of seeking advice or seeing a family counselor, he resolved his restlessness in a selfish and thoughtless way. He requested from his father his share of the family's properties and left home.

In a short time, he spent his funds in permissive and loose living. He was now poor, miserable and living in rags and beggary. Moreover, the swine of his friend were better fed than he. In his deep destitution he realized that in his father's house life would be better even if he was hired as a servant. Then, he noticed that he placed his own pleasures above the love and respect of his parents and remembered his father's love for him.

He carefully prepared his words of repentance and returned home to face his father and be ready to do his fathers' will: "FATHER, DO TO ME WHATEVER YOU WISH. I LEAVE IT TO YOU...." At this, his father welcomed him out of love and mercy.

2-THE FATHER:

He is a rich landowner and loves his children very much. We find him generous in granting his youngest son's request. However, knowing how blind young people can be and how wrong and stubborn they can be in their determination and decisions, we wonder if any help can make them change their mind. How many children listen to their fathers? Nevertheless, we ought to tell them what are the consequences of their foolish decisions. In this parable, the father hoped and prayed till his loved son returned. He did not demand any apology; but he immediately, received him back as his son and not as a servant.

Moreover, the father ordered for him the finest robe (like that of a dignified child), the ring (symbol of trust in sharing paternal authority upon the servants), and shoes befitting a noble man. Finally, his son's return home is also celebrated by a lavish and expensive banquet. All the generosity of the loving father was displayed for the dusty and ragged child, who repented and returned home

3-THE ELDER SON:

He took an unpleasant attitude. He became angry for what he heard and saw and refused to enter his own house. In vain his father pleaded with him, tried to make him understand and convince him to join the celebration. He rejected all and stated that he, the faithful son and not his immoral brother, deserved such a treatment and celebration.

What happened after that is everyone's guess! Jesus left the story unfinished. His main intention, however, is to show us on one hand, that God's (our Father's) love and forgiveness are far greater than anything experienced on earth, and on the other hand, that we, humans, in contrast to God, have difficulty to forgive our fellowmen.

This is why, instead of calling the parable "THE PRODIGAL SON", we may call it either the parable of "THE FORGIVING FATHER", who is ready to receive us with open arms if we repent and make a good confession. Or we may call it the parable of "THE UNFORGIVING BROTHER".

Meditation for Lent: Ask, Seek, Knock

Jesus said to his disciples: "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." (Matt 7:7)

Reflection: In 1942, Warner Sallman painted the scene of Jesus knocking at the door, a door that had no outside handle. If the door were to be opened, it had to be opened from the inside. The painting was a rendition of Revelation 3:20, a verse in which the Lord is seeking entrance into our lives. A great Lenten question: will we allow Jesus to come into our souls and dine with us?

When Jesus tells the disciples to ask, to seek, and to knock, we must realize that Jesus is always the one to take the initiative. He first knocks at the door of our life before we knock on the door of heaven; he seeks out the lost sheep long before the flock seeks the Good Shepherd; he asks us to share our gifts with others before we ask him for renewed grace. Again, we are to emulate the God in whose image and likeness we are made.

So, what will you ask for this Lent? Better health? A deeper prayer life? The healing of relationships? Greater wisdom and compassion? The gift of tears, tears of repentance? A world of justice and peace? These are noble requests. Yet, too often we ask for greater personal recognition, more possessions or control, an increase in comfort and security. We are co-opted by our culture and it is only through the grace of the Holy Spirit that we request what is best for others and for ourselves.

So, what do you seek? The widow sought her lost coin; the shepherd, his lost sheep; the father, his prodigal son. We are all searchers and everyone seeks some form of meaning to life. Most people seek integration in a broken world. Many are looking for depth in a world of superficiality. Such goals are noble. Yet, we can also chase after rainbows and waste our time looking for that nonexistent pot of gold.

So, where do you go to find the Lord? In what sacred geography does God dwell? All we have to do is turn toward the mystery of creation and there, in the starry, starry night, in the flight of the eagle, in the beauty of the ocean and mountain, we are immersed in the "divine milieu." And we can be assured that if we knock, the Lord will open.

Meditation: What does your heart seek? In what ways does God take the initiative in your life? Have you opened the door to our "pilgrim" God?

Prayer: Come, Holy Spirit, teach us your ways. Give us the wisdom to ask and to seek and to knock in all the proper places. Prevent us from wasting our time and energy on things that do not matter. Instruct us in your ways, the ways of love, peace, and joy.

Pope Francis for Married Catholic Priests

Pope Francis this week signaled receptiveness to appeals from bishops in the remote and overwhelmed corners of the Roman Catholic Church to combat a deepening shortage of priests by ordaining married men who are already committed to the church.

In an interview with a German newspaper, the pope made clear that he was not advocating an end to celibacy for current priests or those aspiring to join the clergy. But his seeming openness about the prospect of ordaining married men in places hardest hit by a dearth of priests was unusually explicit and brought the issue to the forefront.

“We need to think about whether ‘viri probati’ could be a possibility,” Francis, using the Latin phrase for such “tested” men, said in an interview with the newspaper, *Die Zeit*. “If so, we would need to determine what duties they could undertake, for example, in remote communities.”

For years, the pope has noted that an element of married clergy already exists in the church. Eastern Rite priests in union with Rome have married for centuries. In 1980, John Paul II created a provision by which some married Protestant ministers who converted to Catholicism could maintain their ministry. And historically, priests in the first centuries of the church were free to marry.

But monastic influences at the turn of the millennium led to the adoption of a celibacy requirement at the First Lateran Council of 1123, and that tradition has held ever since. It is not doctrine or dogma, but instead a code of canon law that essentially reasons that priests unburdened by spouses or children are both more reflective of Christ and devoted to pastoral demands.

Francis, who has made clear that he sees little possibility for allowing women to be priests, called the vocation crisis an “enormous problem.” The issue is less a question of theology than arithmetic.

In the United States, there are now about 2,500 Catholics per priest, compared with 851 per priest in 1972, according to the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate, which is affiliated with Georgetown University. The chasms are far wider in Africa, Asia and Latin America, where the faithful can go months without access to a priest and married deacons are increasingly called on to conduct the business of parishes. In Brazil, according to the center, there are roughly 8,000 Catholics per priest.

The Rev. Thomas J. Reese, a Jesuit priest and senior analyst for *The National Catholic Reporter*, said that in the face of such a crisis, the church had to decide whether upholding the celibacy rule was worth depriving the faithful of Mass and confession, which can only be performed by priests. He said that while the pontiff’s most recent predecessors had hoped for a turnaround in the diminishing numbers of priests, Francis seemed eager to push the issue.

“This is now an open topic in the church today,” Father Reese said, “whereas under John Paul II or Benedict, you could not talk about this.”

Before being chosen as pope in 2013, Francis — who was then Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio — said in remarks included in the book “*On Heaven and Earth*” that clerical celibacy was “a matter of discipline, not of faith. It can change.”

In 2014, as pope, he took a step that made it easier for married men to serve as priests, when he lifted a ban imposed in 1929 that had prohibited Eastern Catholic bishops from ordaining married men to the priesthood in Australia, Canada and the United States.

Until Francis made that change, the Eastern Rite churches could ordain married men only in their own territories.

Also in 2014, Bishop Erwin Krautler, of Xingu, Brazil, a territory where only 27 priests served 700,000 Catholics, brought up the issue with Francis. The bishop told an Austrian newspaper at the time that the pope had told him such a change could not be done by Francis in Rome, but that “local bishops, who are best acquainted with the needs of our faithful, should be courageous and make concrete suggestions.”

Soon after, in 2015, Bishop Leo O’Reilly of Kilmore, Ireland, said that the pope’s message to be creative in confronting priest shortages had led him to establish a commission on the possibility of ordaining married men. “I think the other bishops would be open to the idea,” he told the *Catholic Herald* newspaper.

Veteran observers of Francis have noted that the pope appears especially willing to broach the issue.

In August, the papal biographer Austen Ivereigh wrote on the Catholic news website *Crux* that “Francis has given many signals of his willingness to open up the question of ordaining married men, even encouraging local Churches to put forward proposals.”

Any formal discussion of changing the rule would surely engender opposition among a small but intense group of canon lawyers and traditionalists upset about Francis’ flexibility on issues of church law. In the meantime, the 80-year-old pope seems to be using the media to plant the idea directly with the faithful.

“The glacier is moving forward, but there are forces that want to move it back,” said Paul Bumbar, a former priest and the co-secretary of *Corpus*, an organization founded more than 40 years ago by men who had left the priesthood to marry. “And Francis has made it clear that he does not want to stop. I just pray his health holds out.”
