Announcement to Zechariah

Readings: Rom 4:13-25 and Lk 1:1-25

“THE GOSPEL OF’ JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO LUKE.” To understand what this means, we must realize that a Gospel is not just a collection of anecdotes about Jesus and his teaching. Each evangelist is a witness to the Son of God. He sets himself to answer the question confronting everyone to whom it has been given to meet Jesus, either by hearing someone speak of him, or by discovering him in the life of one of his followers: WHO ARE YOU LORD?” Each of these witnesses relates his faith in Jesus in the form of a story - that of the doings and words of Jesus- expressed in relation to his own experience and background. This explains the originality of each evangelist, each having his own emphasis, his own way of presenting the mystery of Christ and his teaching. For all that, there is only one Gospel, because there is only one Christ, to whom we are sent by all the scriptures...

It happened in Nazareth, in the synagogue, that one day it was Jesus’ turn to comment on the reading from the Law, giving with it a text from the prophets. His choice fell on a text from Isaiah –he does not discuss it, he simply declares: THIS TEXT IS BEING FULFILLED TODAY EVEN AS YOU LISTEN”: HE, IN WHOM ALL THE PROMISES OF GOD HAVE FOUND THEIR ‘YES’ (2 Cor 1:20), could not read the divine word without putting it into practice, without immediately accomplishing it. And this is why miracles flowered under his feet for the poor, for prisoners, for the blind, for the oppressed.

In our turn we cannot read the Gospel as something that belongs to the past. It must be read as of now, IN THE TODAY OF OUR LIFE BEFORE GOD. Then our time, also, will be “THE LORD’S YEAR OF FAVOR.”

Christmas Stories:

1-Saint Nicholas (died in 342 AD)

Better known to children everywhere as Santa Claus, Saint Nicholas is one of the oldest official saints of the Catholic Church. In the early 4th century, Nicholas served as the bishop of Myra, a Mediterranean city today known as Demre. Saint Nicholas attended the Council of Nicea in 325, which is credited for instituting the Nicene Creed, an early predecessor of the creed currently said at Mass.

Saint Nicholas is believed to have first become associated with Christmas because his feast date, like that of the Immaculate Conception, is close to the beginning of the Season. His link to the tradition of gift giving comes from a popular story. In Myra, there was a family of three daughters who were so poor that between them they did not have enough money for even one dowry, so none of them could marry. The eldest offered to sell herself into slavery to at least earn a dowry for the other two. On hearing of this, Nicholas anonymously sent three gifts of money to the family over three years. It is said that the first time he did so the money was thrown down the chimney, creating the myth of Santa Claus and chimneys.

Following Nicholas' death in 342, he became the subject of popular devotion and many stories spread of his miracles. Today we recognize Saint Nicholas not only as the mythical Santa Claus, but also as the patron saint of children.

2-Santa's Team

I remember my first Christmas party with Grandma. I was just a kid. I remember tearing across town on my bike to visit her on the day my big sister dropped the bomb: "There is no Santa Claus," she jeered. "Even dummies know that!"

My grandma was not the gushy kind, never had been. I fled to her that day because I knew she would be straight with me. I knew Grandma always told the truth, and I knew that the truth always went down a whole lot easier when swallowed with one of her world-famous cinnamon buns.

That was a bundle in those days. "Take this money," she said, "and buy something for someone who needs it. I'll wait for you in the car." Then she turned and walked out of Kerby's.

I was only eight years old. I'd often gone shopping with my mother, but never had I shopped for anything all by myself. The store seemed big and crowded, full of people scrambling to finish their Christmas shopping. For a few moments I just stood there, confused, clutching that ten-dollar bill, wondering what to buy, and who on earth to buy it for.

I thought of everybody I knew: my family, my friends, my neighbors, the kids at school, and the people who went to my church. I was just about thought out, when I suddenly thought of Bobbie Decker. He was a kid with bad breath and messy hair, and he sat right behind me in Mrs. Pollock's grade-two class.

Bobbie Decker didn't have a coat. I knew that because he never went out for recess during the winter. His mother always wrote a note, telling the teacher that he had a cough, but all we kids knew that Bobbie Decker didn't have a cough, and he didn't have a coat. I fingered the ten-dollar bill with growing excitement. I would buy Bobbie Decker a coat.

I settled on a red corduroy one that had a hood to it. It looked real warm, and he would like that. "Is this a Christmas present for someone?" the lady behind the counter asked kindly, as I laid my ten dollars down. "Yes," I replied shyly. "It's ... for Bobbie." The nice lady smiled at me. I didn't get any change, but she put the coat in a bag and wished me a Merry Christmas.

That evening, Grandma helped me wrap the coat in Christmas paper and ribbons, and write, "To Bobbie, From Santa Claus" on it -- Grandma said that Santa always insisted on secrecy. Then she drove me over to Bobbie Decker's house, explaining as we went that I was now and forever officially one of Santa's helpers.

Grandma parked down the street from Bobbie's house, and she and I crept noiselessly and hid in the bushes by his front walk Then Grandma gave me a nudge. "All right, Santa Claus," she whispered, "get going."

I took a deep breath, dashed for his front door, threw the present down on his step, pounded his doorbell and flew back to the safety of the bushes and Grandma. Together we waited breathlessly in the darkness for the front door to open. Finally it did, and there stood Bobbie.

Forty years haven't dimmed the thrill of those moments spent shivering, beside my grandma, in Bobbie Decker's bushes. That night, I realized that those awful rumors about Santa Claus were just what Grandma said they were: ridiculous. Santa was alive and well, and we were on his team.
