Readings: Gal 3:15-22 and Lk 1:26-38

David's House Not Powerful In Jesus' Day

“The angel Gabriel was sent from God to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the house of David.” Luke 1 :26-27

What does “the house of David” imply? Do we know anything about David’s ancestors living in Jesus’ day?

No. The last explicit reference to descendants of David appears in a genealogical list some four and a half centuries before Jesus. What is noteworthy is that these Davidic Jews enjoy no special distinction in this list. This contrasts sharply with the situation half a century earlier, when Zerubbabel, grandson of the last Davidic king, governed Judah on behalf of his Persian masters, and was himself the focus of messianic expectation (Hag 2:20-23; Zec 6:9-13).

The fact of the matter is that David’s descendants (his “house”) lacked any discernible importance, political or religious, in the minds of most Jews throughout much of the Second Temple period. The main reason for this was that the political function of the Davidic line was now performed by foreign rulers (e.g., Is 45:1).

All this changed when, in the course of the 2nd century BC, a priestly family, the Hasmoneans (also known as the “Maccabees”), gained independence for their country and proclaimed themselves kings. Jews critical of Hasmonean pretensions sought to impugn their legitimacy by reviving the tradition that God had chosen only the house of David to rule over Israel.

Still, as far as we know, this resurgent commitment to a Davidic messiah did not translate into an interest in any of David’s actual descendants. Consequently, no one bothered to write about them.

Happy Thanksgiving

In 2011, at the general audience in St. Peter's Square, Pope Benedict XVI reminded Christians to thank God for the good things in life, instead of only bringing problems to him.

He said, "Dear brothers and sisters, in our prayers we should look at how often, in the events of our lives, the Lord has protected us, guided us, helped us." He encouraged Christians to "be more attentive to the good things that the Lord gives us. We are always attentive to the problems, difficulties and almost do not want to see that there are good things come from the Lord."

In his latest discourse on prayer, Pope Benedict was dwelt on Psalm 126. It charts the joy of the Jewish people returning from their exile in Babylon in the 6th century B.C. Even today, the psalm is sung in an upbeat, joyous manner at Jewish religious occasions. "When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dreamed," reads the psalm's first line as it depicts a people whose "mouths were filled with laughter" and "tongues with songs of joy." The psalm "celebrates the great things which the Lord has done for His people, and which He continues to do for all believers," said Pope Benedict.

The importance of this gratitude to God, he added, is that it creates hearts "full of joy" and memories "of the good that also helps us in the dark hours."

Such good memories are required by the Jewish people in the psalm, the Pope observed, as they returned to find to a promised land now "impoverished, devastated." "Those who sow with tears will reap with songs of joy," is how the psalmist expresses his hope.

"This imagery of the seed which silently grows to maturity reminds us that God's salvation is at once a gift already received and the object of our hope, a promise whose fulfillment remains in the future," the Pope. And he noted how Jesus later uses the same imagery to "express the passage from death to life, from darkness to light, which must take place in the lives of all who put their faith in him and share in his paschal mystery."

"This psalm teaches us that, in our prayer, we must always remain hopeful and firm in our faith in God," even when our life is "marked often by suffering, uncertainty, moments of crisis," said the Pope.

This hope and faith is fulfilled in Jesus, with whom "our exile ends, and every tear is dried." It is in the "great discovery of Jesus Christ" that "we learn that even in dark nights, not to forget that the light exists, that God is already in the midst of our life and that we can sow with great confidence."

Pope Benedict finished his discourse by saying: "As we pray this Psalm, may we echo the song of the Virgin Mary by rejoicing in the great things which the Almighty has done for us, and by awaiting in hope the fulfillment of God's promises."

Story

If you were going to die soon and had only one phone call you could make, who would you call and what would you say? And why are you waiting?

When I was superintendent of schools in Palo Alto, California, Folly Tyner, the president of our board of trustees, wrote a letter that was printed in the Palo Alto Times. Folly's son, Jim, had great difficulty in

school. He was classified as educationally handicapped and required a great deal of patience on the part of his parents and teachers. But Jim was a happy kid with a great smile that lit up the room. His parents acknowledged his academic difficulties, but always tried to help him see his strengths so that he could walk with pride. Shortly after Jim finished high school, he was killed in a motorcycle accident. After his death, his mother submitted this letter to the newspaper.

Today we buried our 20-year-old son. He was killed instantly in a motorcycle accident on Friday night. How I wish I had known when I talked to him last that it would be the last time. If I had only known I would have said, "Jim, I love you and I'm so very proud of you."

I would have taken the time to count the many blessings he brought to the lives of the many who loved him. I would have taken time to appreciate his beautiful smile, the sound of his laughter, his genuine love of people.

When you put all the good attributes on the scale and you try to balance all the irritating traits such as the radio which was always too loud, the haircut that wasn't to our liking, the dirty socks under the bed, etc., the irritations don't amount to much.

I won't get another chance to tell my son all I would have wanted him to hear, but, other parents, you do have a chance. Tell your young people what you would want them to hear if you knew it would be your last conversation. The last time I talked to Jim was the day he died. He called me to say, "Hi, Mom! I just called to say I love you. Got to go to work. Bye." He gave me something to treasure forever. If there is any purpose at all to Jim's death, maybe it is to make others appreciate more of life and to have people, especially families, take the time to let each other know just how much we care.

You may never have another chance. Do it today!
