Announcement to Mary

Readings: Gal 3:15-22 and Lk 1:26-38

Think about how Mary must have felt when she first learned of her impending pregnancy. She could have just said: "NO". Do you think she was tempted to? After she was moved to say "YES", do you suppose maybe she had second thoughts? How often do you think she must have rehearsed her speech to Joseph? How many tears do you think she shed before the wedding?

Now think about Elizabeth. How do you suppose she felt when she learned she was finally pregnant? Ever known someone who had a child late in life? Even if she had always desired a child, don't you imagine Elizabeth was shocked, and scared, and wondering why...why her...why now? How was she doing to cope with a new baby? -and a speechless husband- at her age?

Even the unidentified woman from the Old Testament must have been quite taken aback with the news of her baby. This was obviously a surprise, an unplanned pregnancy. Ever experience one of those, even vicariously? The first thought is not, "Thank God, I'm pregnant!"

And yet... and yet...Mary, Elizabeth, the woman who served as God's sign to Ahaz. . .all accepted God's will, and their humble acceptance had profound effects on untold lives.

Is not today's message crystal clear? Be led by the Spirit. Choose life!

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Lower your 2020 Income Tax Bill

Dear Parishioners and benefactors,

The CARES Act passed by Congress a few months ago has certain tax benefits for Parishioners who choose to donate to their Churches. This will help to benefit all Parishioners who make their end of year charitable giving decisions. The Act allows a personal tax deduction of \$300.00 in charitable contributions, even to those who do not itemize. A more important and substantial benefit of the Act, is that Parishioners can deduct 100% of their charitable contributions from their adjusted gross income. In years past, the most one could deduct was 60%. This means that every Dollar the parishioners give to their Church can be fully written off on their taxes.

One way to lower your income tax bill for this year is to make charitable contributions, which can be deducted from your income if you are planning to itemize your deductions when you file your 2020 income tax. Gifts you make to charities, such as **Our Lady of Lebanon Church**, are tax deductible. But in order for you to claim the deduction on your tax return for **2020**, you must make the gift this year. That is important to keep in mind if you are planning on making a year-end gift. For example, if you are going to give money using a check, be sure the date on the check is on or before December 31st, 2020. Also, be sure to give the check to the church on or before that date. The IRS requires that you have a letter or receipt from the church that received the gift. By the **end of January 2021** all donors will receive a statement from **the Church** stating their names and the amount of gift received –through checks or weekly offering envelopes- from **January 1st, 2020 until December 31st, 2020**. It is wise to keep the church statement with your tax records, in case the IRS questions your itemized deductions.

Story: God used Him

Truck driver Rod, sixty—two, believes an impromptu prayer meeting led to his spotting the two Washington, D.C. area sniper suspects who had allegedly killed ten people before Lantz saw them at an interstate rest area in Maryland. The arrests of suspects John Allen Muhammad and John Lee Malvo undoubtedly saved lives. Law enforcement officials claim the pair had been plotting their next attack. But that does not bring Rod much comfort.

“I'd like to have had it ended before that,” laments Rod. Still, he insists that God orchestrated the men's capture. Rod, a trucker for more than thirty years, would listen to talk radio during his regular haul from Kentucky to Maryland. He was horrified at the news of each sniper attack. During one of these trips he decided to do something about it.

“I was on a CB radio talking to drivers,” he said “and I asked them if they would follow me into this rest area and have a little prayer service about our country and about the snipers.

“Lo and behold, about fifty truckers were there. It took about fifty-eight minutes to have the prayer meeting. I just thought these people had to be caught some way or the other and that somebody was going to catch them.”

The next Wednesday, Rod was called in to work on his clay off. Looking back, he can see God’s hand in the events that followed. That day, he was stopped by police three separate times but was not ticketed. With each stop he was delayed a few minutes while the cops checked his paperwork. “I’ve been driving a truck for thirty-six years and that’s never happened before,” he noted.

The same day, Rod heard a description of the snipers’ car. “I got down on I-95. They described the car, the people in it, and the license-plate number. I wrote it down,” said Rod.

On his return trip to Kentucky he pulled into a rest area on Interstate 70 in Frederick County, Maryland, and immediately recognized the Chevrolet Caprice the police were looking for. Muhammad was asleep inside the car, and Malvo was resting on a park bench.

Rod immediately placed an emergency call and waited for the police to arrive. An officer who responded told Rod to use his rig to block the exit. Rod then got on his CB radio and asked another trucker to block the entrance. He said he wasn’t worried about his own safety.

“I wasn’t scared,” Rod said. “I mean, the person I am, I’m not scared because the good Lord just put me there to do what I did.”

Until 1997, Rod had stayed away from church. That year, he promised his dying adult son that he would commit his life to serving God. Rod did not realize it, but hours before he spotted the alleged snipers, a group at his church had held a prayer meeting of their own and had prayed for the killer’s capture.
