Sunday of the Hemorrhaging woman

Readings: 2 Cor 7:4-11 and Lk 8:40-56

The story of the healing hemorrhaging woman is reported by the three Synoptic evangelists: Matthew, Mark and Luke. (Mt 9:20-22, Mk 5:25-34, Lk 8:43-48). Mark's text contains more detail than the others. The woman was cured of an issue of blood, and Jesus said to her, "**Daughter it is your faith that has cured you. Go in peace and be free of this illness.**" (Mark 5:34).

Particularly curious in this case of healing is that the hemorrhaging woman did not make a request of Jesus for healing. In general, sick people approached Jesus and asked him to cure them; or they were brought to him by others who made the request for them. In this case, the woman came up behind Jesus and touched His cloak, and immediately she was cured (Mark 5:27-28).

Her case was humanly hopeless. Several doctors tried in vain to cure her, and "**she exhausted her savings in the process, yet she got no relief; on the contrary, she only grew worse.**" (Mark 5:26). Then she heard about Jesus and put her faith in Him to restore her total health.

Faith can be alive and strong, even in complete silence. Both active and contemplative religious orders please God. Often we ignore the reason why the sick woman did not face Jesus and openly petition the miracle. None of the three evangelists provides us with an answer to this question. It may be her shyness or her feminine decency; in all probability, she did not want to reveal publicly her gynecological illness. Perhaps she also feared that she would be rejected by the public since according to Jewish law (Leviticus 13: 1-2 and 44-46), her bleeding condition rendered her ritually impure. But this is only speculation. The important thing is that she had strong faith in Jesus. Sober and reserved in her belief, she wished only to "**touch His clothing.**" (Mark 5:28). No need for her to make a long speech, no need for ostentation.

Her attitude tells us that we must also deal delicately and discretely with delicate matters. Jesus granted her wish and praised this faith of hers; faith and decency go together, and Jesus appreciates both.

The healing of the hemorrhaging woman reveals Jesus' power over incurable diseases and His sensitive concern for everyone in need. Jesus is both healer and savior of mankind. When He sent His disciples to preach the Gospel He commanded them to "**heal the sick**" (Matthew 9:8).

God created the human person healthy in body and soul. But sin, the mortal sickness of the soul brought sickness to the body as its consequence. Every person became basically sick. Christ came to heal all our sicknesses, as Isaiah the prophet says: "**It was our infirmities that He bore our sufferings that He endured.**" (Isaiah 53:4). Jesus became, so to speak, "**sinner**" and "**ill**" for our sakes, in order that we may have health in soul and body. Without Jesus we all remain sinners and sick. Only in, with, and through Him can we become completely whole

In conclusion, Jesus forgives us all our sins, even those for which we are humanly ashamed!

Story: That is God

It was one of the hottest days of the dry season. We had not seen rain in almost a month. The crops were dying. Cows had stopped giving milk. The creeks and streams were long gone back into the earth. It was a dry season that would bankrupt several farmers before it was through. Every day, my husband and his brothers would go about the arduous process of trying to get water to the fields. Lately this process had involved taking a truck to the local water rendering plant and filling it up with water. But severe rationing had cut everyone off. If we didn't see some rain soon ... we would lose everything. It was on this day that I learned the true lesson of sharing and witnessed the only miracle I have seen with my own eyes.

I was in the kitchen making lunch for my husband and his brothers when I saw my six-year-old son, Billy, walking toward the woods. He wasn't walking with the usual carefree abandon of a youth but with a serious purpose. I could only see his back. He was obviously walking with a great effort ... trying to be as still as possible. Minutes after he disappeared into the woods, he came running out again, toward the house. I went back to making sandwiches; thinking that whatever task he had been doing was completed. Moments later, however, he was once again walking in that slow purposeful stride toward the woods. This activity went on for an hour: walking carefully to the woods, running back to the house. Finally I couldn't take it any longer and I crept out of the house and followed him on his journey (being very careful not to be seen ... as he was obviously doing important work and didn't need his Mommy checking up on him). He was cupping both hands in front of him as he walked, being very careful not to spill the water he held in them ... maybe two or three tablespoons were held in his tiny hands. I sneaked close as he went into the woods. Branches and thorns slapped his little face, but he did not try to avoid them. He had a much higher purpose. As I leaned in to spy on him, I saw the most amazing site. Several large deer loomed in front of him. Billy walked right up to them. I almost screamed for him to get away. A huge buck with elaborate antlers was dangerously close. But the buck did not threaten him ... he didn't even move as Billy knelt down. And I saw a tiny fawn lying on the ground; obviously suffering from dehydration and heat exhaustion, lift its head with great effort to lap up the water cupped in my beautiful boy's hand. When the water was gone, Billy jumped up to run back to the house and I hid behind a tree. I followed him back to the house to a spigot to which we had shut off the water. Billy opened it all the way up and a small trickle began to creep out. He knelt there, letting the drip, drip slowly fill up his makeshift "cup," as the sun beat down on his little back. And it came clear to me: The trouble he had gotten into for playing with the

hose the week before. The lecture he had received about the importance of not wasting water. The reason he didn't ask me to help him. It took almost twenty minutes for the drops to fill his hands. When he stood up and began the trek back, I was there in front of him.

His little eyes just filled with tears. "I'm not wasting," was all he said. As he began his walk, I joined him ... with a small pot of water from the kitchen. I let him tend to the fawn. I stayed away. It was his job. I stood on the edge of the woods watching the most beautiful heart I have ever known working so hard to save another life. As the tears that rolled down my face began to hit the ground, other drops ... and more drops ... and more suddenly joined them. I looked up at the sky. It was as if God, himself, was weeping with pride.

Some will probably say that this was all just a huge coincidence. Those miracles don't really exist. That it was bound to rain sometime. And I can't argue with that ... I'm not going to try. All I can say is that the rain that came that day saved our farm ... just like the actions of one little boy saved another.

I don't know if anyone will read this ... but I had to send it out. To honor the memory of my beautiful Billy, who was taken from me much too soon ... But not before showing me the true face of God, in a little, sunburned body.
