Easter Sunday

Readings: 1 Cor 15:12-26 and Mk 16:1-8

In his appearances to his disciples after his resurrection, Jesus is sometimes not recognized by them. Mary Magdalene mistakes him for a gardener, and in Galilee, as they bring their boat to shore, his disciples do not recognize him at first. He is not quite the same. He looks different, for resurrection is so marvelous and so magnificent that it is a total transformation.

Yet in another sense, it is the same Jesus. He walks with them, He converses with them and even cooks breakfast and shares it with them. (John 21:13) Not only is He transformed, but so is the entire universe. It may look the same, but because of Jesus Christ the Lord, behold, all things are new.

The “hour” is fulfilled, the Passover is completed, the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. What else can one cry but ALLELUIA, Praise God!

ALLELUIA for “the immeasurable greatness of his power in us who believe, according to the working of his great might, which he accomplished in Christ when he raised him from the dead.” (Ephesians 1:19-20)

ALLELUIA for “Death is swallowed up in victory ... Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.” (1 Corinthians 15:54, 57)

ALLELUIA: “If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit which dwells in you.” (Romans 8:11) We need not seek “proofs” of the Resurrection. We are that proof.

Dear Friends, The Covid-19 Pandemic has disrupted our lives this past year. As we begin to see the light at the end of the tunnel with the vaccine distribution; life will be back to some type of “normal” soon. Therefore, I call on you to come back to your spiritual home that is the Church.

Holy Week and Easter is an opportune time to come together to celebrate the Mystery of our Salvation, to thank God for His Divine Providence, and for the Abundance of His Blessings and Graces. Our return to Church is not just a matter of dispensation and obligation, but our yearning, desire, and need to be with the Lord. As the Psalm says, “I was glad when they said to me, ‘Let us go to the house of the Lord!’” (122:1).

In our life, we need to give God priority over everything else as He is the Creator, the Provider, the Sustainer, and the Source of all good things. God is the most essential. Our Churches are following CDC requirements even better than stores, restaurants, airlines and other open locations. To ensure everyone’s safety, we need to remember to wear our facemasks properly, follow proper social distancing guidelines, and sanitation. However, if at any time you feel some type of illness, you should stay home as an act of safety and care for the whole community and the well-being of everyone.

We have been hearing, talking about social distancing during the Pandemic, I hope and pray that you felt the closeness of God more than ever in these times. As your Bishop, I was carrying you close to my heart and mind in my daily prayers asking the Lord to grant eternal life to our faithful departed, to all the victims of the Coronavirus and their grieving families. We pray for the safety and support of medical personnel, and for all

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those who have been impacted by the Pandemic. I will keep carrying you in my prayers, as I hope you carry me in yours.

The church is here to serve you and to inform you about all the events that are taking place in the parish. Throughout the year, our parishioners requested to receive mailings concerning: Saint Maron Dinner, Bake Sale, Lebanese Food Festival, Spaghetti Dinner, Diocesan Appeal, Raffles, and Masses for their beloved ones. Do you know that nothing is free in USA even for the churches?

Do you know that for this year alone, our building insurance is \$12,831.00, the elevator warranty and permit is \$3,276.58 and the health insurance is \$16,800.00 and utilities \$16,548 and phone and internet \$2,940.00? The total of all these expenses is \$52,395.58 without mentioning the office supplies and maintenance.

If the ladies and gentlemen -who are the backbones of every church- don't volunteer and raise funds via dinners and other events, no church would remain open. We are not asking for your money for we know that you have your own house bills to pay, but we need you to open your mind about our obligations toward you so you don't complain about something you ignore.

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Our church is doing great because we have many generous parishioners and the pastor is sparing lot of expenses by driving his own car and living in his own house paying from his pocket his own electricity bills, cable TV, water and other personal taxes. –Msgr.
