Transfiguration of our Lord

Readings: 2 Cor 3:7-17 and Mk 9:1-7

The surprise of the Transfiguration is found in the expression of Jesus' divinity - "His clothing became dazzlingly white." Not until the Resurrection, not even when Jesus performs some of his most spectacular miracles, is his divinity so expressly revealed. A possible reason for this might be that the apostles need to be strengthened in their belief and in their faith.

The Transfiguration occurs immediately after Jesus predicts his passion and death. This is the first time that the apostles have heard him speak in this manner. Undoubtedly, this prediction causes some grumbling, a little doubting, and possibly even a hint of uncertainty and confusion among the disciples. So, God hands them a vision that would inspire courage!

The voice of God, coming from the clouds, is also an indication of the purpose of the Transfiguration. "This is my Son, my Chosen One. Listen to him." This is a clear exhortation to the apostles to listen to Jesus, and not to the voices of the scribes and Pharisees, those other "voices" that call out for attention.

The power of the witness of the Transfiguration is not limited to the apostles. It is also meant for each of us. If we might be inclined to dismiss the teaching of Jesus, or to listen to the "other voices" that call out to us for our attention, the events of this day are a clear remedy. "This is my Son, my Son, my Chosen One. Listen to him."

What's New?***Spirituality: Grace***

A plant is more than the sum of the chemicals that enter into it, because a plant possesses an X quality that is not in the chemical order; an animal is something more than the sum of plant qualities, because it possesses an X that is not found in the antecedent order; and, in the same way, man possesses an X quality that makes him different from the animal, something that makes him able to laugh and think and freely love.
