Assumption

Readings: Rom 12:9-15 and Lk 1:46-55

“Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.” (Luke 1:46-56)

When good things happen in our lives, we step up to take credit. The new home or car is possible because we have worked hard and saved carefully. We have loyal friends, loving children, and a wonderful spouse because we are loyal, loving, and wonderful ourselves. We have learned to take credit for our blessings.

I have lost count of the number of times I have been asked by people who are experiencing difficult times in their lives, “Do you think God is punishing me for some sin in my past?” Unfortunately, I have never been asked by those who are living through times of joy and happiness, “Why do you think God is rewarding me?” Hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes, and floods are referred to as “acts of God”; sunny days with skies of fleckless blue, the explosive colors of fall foliage, the first crocuses that push through the ground in spring, the magnificent experience of a rosy-colored dawn or the orange fingers of a stunning sunset are seldom, if ever, called acts of God.

Mary’s heart and life were filled with gratitude. She not only said, “Thank God!” she lived “Thank God!” She made herself a lens that magnified God’s greatness. She has shown us the way.

What's New?

Spirituality: Grace

As a person must be born before he can begin to lead his physical life, so he must be born to lead a Divine Life. That birth occurs in the Sacrament of Baptism. To survive, the person must be nourished by Divine Life; that is done in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. He must grow spiritually and assume his spiritual responsibilities; that is accomplished in the Sacrament of Confirmation. He must heal the wounds of sin; for this there is the Sacrament of Penance. He must wipe out the traces of sin at the end, to prepare for his journey to eternal life; for this there is the Sacrament of Extreme Unction. Man must also prolong and edify the Kingdom of God, for which he is given the Sacrament of Matrimony. He must live under a spiritual government; this is provided through the Sacrament of Holy Orders in the Priesthood.

Nature *makes* human nature, but grace *remakes* human nature. Every person who has been born can also be regenerated, renewed, and revived if he establishes contact with new and divine sources of energy. Christianity puts a high value on human nature, but it does not trust its unaided powers too far. It says that man in his human nature is neither a saint nor a devil; he is neither intrinsically corrupt nor immaculately conceived. He needs divine assistance to perfect this nature. And it is available to him, no matter how wicked he has been in the past; even a man who stoned a martyr like Stephen, as Paul did, can still be saved, not of himself but by the grace of God -as Paul was. And since the new energy and new power to rescue him come from God, it is beside the point for anyone to plead, "*I am not good enough.*" Of course not -no person is good enough. But hidden reserves of power are available to anyone who so desires. That was why Our Savior said: "***Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and you shall find; knock, and it shall be opened to you.***" (Mt 7:7).

Wisdom: Creation

One of the most important things that any religion can teach us is what it means to be human. The Bible's vision of Man is a fundamental to its overall outlook as its vision of God. Two passages at the very beginning of the Bible teach us about being human, and tell us how we, as human beings, relate to God and to the world around us.

The first is the statement in the opening chapter of the Book of Genesis that human beings are made in the image of God. At the climax of the Creation process, God is represented as saying, "Let us made Man in our image." Why the plural? Who is the "us," the "our" of which God speaks? It seems that this sentence is connected to the sentences that preceded it.

God first creates a world covered with water, He then causes the dry land to emerge, fills His world with plants, fish, birds, and reptiles, and finally with mammals. Having created animals and beasts, He says ***to them:*** "Let us arrange for a new kind of creature to emerge, a human being, in ***our*** image, yours and Mine. Let us fashion a creature that will be like you, an animal, in some ways -needing to eat, to sleep, to mate- and will be like Me in other ways, rising above the animal level. You animals will contribute his physical dimension, and I

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will breathe a soul into him.” And so, as the crown of Creation, human beings are created, part animal, part divine.
