7th Sunday after the Holy Cross

Readings: Job 29:12-17; Rom 12:9-21 and Mt 25:31-46

A young lady named Sally, relates an experience she had in a seminary class, given by her teacher, Dr. Smith. She says Dr. Smith was known for his elaborate object lessons. One particular day, Sally walked into the seminary and knew they were in for a fun day.

On the wall was a big target and on a nearby table were many darts. Dr. Smith told the students to draw a picture of someone that they disliked or someone who had made them angry, and he would allow them to throw darts at the person's picture.

Sally's girlfriend drew a picture of a girl who had stolen her boyfriend. Another friend drew a picture of his little brother. Sally drew a picture of a former friend, putting a great deal of detail into her drawing, even drawing pimples on the face. Sally was pleased with the overall effect she had achieved.

The class lined up and began throwing darts. Some of the students threw their darts with such force that their targets were ripping apart. Sally looked forward to her turn, and was filled with disappointment when Dr. Smith, because of time limits, asked the students to return to their seats. As Sally sat thinking about how angry she was because she didn't have a chance to throw any darts at her target.

Dr. Smith began removing the target from the wall. Underneath the target was a picture of Jesus. A hush fell over the room as each student viewed the mangled picture of Jesus; holes and jagged marks covered His face and His eyes were pierced.

Dr. Smith said only these words: "Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of these my brethren, you have done it unto Me." (Mt 25:40)

No other words were necessary; the tear-filled eyes of the students focused only on the picture of Christ.

THE SWEETNESS OF MAKING VISITS TO THE BLESSED SACRAMENT, AND MOTIVES FOR MAKING THEM.

"If we really loved the good God, we should make it our joy and happiness to come and spend a few moments" before the tabernacle "to adore him, and ask him for the grace of forgiveness; and we should regard those moments as the happiest in our lives. Oh! How sweet and consoling are moments spent with the God of goodness. Are you in sorrow? Come and cast yourself at his feet and you will feel quite consoled. Are you despised by the world? Come here and you will find a good friend whose faithfulness will never fail you. Are

you tempted? It is here that you will find strong and terrible weapons to vanquish your enemies. Do you fear the formidable judgment that has made the greatest saints tremble? Profit by the time in which your God is the God of mercies, and while it is so easy to win your pardon from him. Are you oppressed by poverty? Come here and you will find a God infinitely rich, and who will tell you that his wealth is yours, not in this world, but in the next. 'It is there that I am preparing for you infinite riches; go, despise the riches that perish, and you will have those that never decay.' "Sinners, "ask him with tears and sorrow for the pardon of your sins, and you are sure to obtain it." You who are reconciled with him, "beg for the precious gift of perseverance. Oh! Tell him that if you are to offend him again, you would far rather die. Would you begin to taste the joy of the saints? Come here and you will know the happy beginnings of it.

Story

Because I fly often, I have been able to meet many interesting people on planes. I usually look for opportunities to get to know people and, if possible, to share my faith in Christ with them. Evangelists often refer to this as "planting seeds of faith."

One early morning as I was sitting in my seat waiting for the plane to take off, I noticed a young woman walk through the door of the aircraft. I'm sure everyone else in first class must have noticed her as well because she was a very striking lady. She took her seat next to mine and reached into her carry-on bag for her daily newspaper.
