Renewal of the church

Readings: 2 Mac 10:1-9; Heb 9:11-15 and Jn 10:22-42

With the risen Christ, we gather faithfully together on the Lord's day. We are transformed into his Body and Blood for the world. Filled with the joy of the Spirit, we have the courage to proclaim God's word. Sometimes we know victory; at other times, defeat. At times people listen; other times, they turn a deaf ear. Though success and disappointment alternately accompany our work, we do not give up. We refuse to listen to the voice of discouragement. We obey the voice of the Lord, who reminds us: "I have made you a light to all nations, a means of salvation to the ends of the earth!"

The Spirit invites us to lift up our eyes and try to catch a glimpse of the vision John sees: a huge throng from "every nation and race, people and tongue" dressed in white baptismal garments and waving palm branches of victory. When we see with John's eyes, we have our own experience on the Lord's day, perhaps different from John's but just as real. When Christians take part in the great chorus raised in heaven, then things really begin to happen on earth. Never again will people suffer and mourn, hunger or thirst, for the Lamb of God is their shepherd.

"My sheep hear my voice and follow me," Jesus tells us. Though God will not always shield us from adversity, Jesus guides his flock to life-giving waters. Jesus has a firm grip on those in his care, and no one can snatch them away. "We are his people, the flock that he tends," we rejoice in God's faithfulness, which endures to all generations.

Story

Years ago, while unearthing an ancient Egyptian tomb, an archaeologist came upon seeds buried in a piece of wood. Planted, the seeds realized their potential after more than 3,000 years! She was awarded her (GED) high school diploma.

But more misfortune was to visit Nancy. After leaving the reformatory, she became pregnant without benefit of marriage. Then, two years later a second pregnancy resulted in a stroke, erasing her hard-earned powers of reading and writing. With the help and support of her father, Nancy battled back, regaining what she had lost.

In dire financial straits, Nancy went on welfare. Finally, to make ends meet, she took in seven foster children. It was during this period that she started taking courses at a community college. Upon completion of her course work, she applied to and was accepted by the Medical School to study medicine.

In the spring Nancy paraded in full academic regalia across the graduation stage. No one can know what private thoughts went through her mind as she reached out to grasp this eloquent testimony to her self-belief and perseverance, her diploma that announced to all the world: Here stands on this small point of Planet Earth a person who dared to dream the impossible dream, a person who confirms for all of us our human divineness. Here stands Nancy, M.D.
