Commemoration of the Priests

Readings: Mal 2:1-9; 1Tim 4:6-16 and Lk 12:42-48

A priest celebrating his 50th Anniversary to the priesthood wrote:

I could enumerate all the people to whom I am so greatly indebted and all the things for which I am grateful. But you did not come to hear a litany of platitudes, however so deserved.

I first ministered in After six happy years, I enjoyed another six fulfilling years ing. Then, I began a love affair of the heart with Charleston, our capital city, that has endured through 11 years at St. Agnes and 27 years, thus far, at Sacred Heart.

By virtue of our baptism, we all share the priesthood. Sacred Scripture and Catholic theology are clear: "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people," and Catholic liturgy acknowledges this when the deacon will incense you along with the bishop and the ordained priests.

The ordained priest is the servant of God and you, his people. Ordination does not separate us from you. We teach and firmly believe that the Catholic priest is chosen by the Church from among you and is anointed to praise and glorify God and intercede with God on your behalf. We do this by daily prayer and primarily and uniquely by offering the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Ordination is a summons to service and under God; it is you we are ordained to serve. Not always easy because you are who you are and we are who we are. And we priests are not fabricated in the seminary. We are extroverts and introverts, thinkers and doers, spontaneous and deliberate. We share the faults of sinful humans and can be as small as the next man. We get discouraged when we do not live up to our own ideals and your expectations. We get frustrated when our plans do not materialize. We are saddened when our homilies leave you cold; we light up like a Christmas tree when we delight you.

We get lonely for friendship, for love and we find aging difficult to enjoy alone. While we feel a special relationship with God, we know, far better than you can ever appreciate, that we are men with feet of clay. As we have been painfully reminded in recent years, we too, are inherently flawed because of sin.

Counselors of priests can testify better than most, that the priest is not immune to spiritual illnesses and psychological problems, is not impervious to human struggles and destructive behaviors.

We, on our part, rely completely on the special grace God gives us to serve you, the people of God. We have been strengthened, too, by our faith that Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, took on human flesh and became divinely human. And as it was the humanity of Jesus that attracted people to Him, so it is with priests. You identify with our vulnerable humanity as servant-priests.

Dear people of God, you know that priests are not beyond human problems, but don't presume, as some do, that the celibate, male, Catholic priest is defective and abnormal, or sad and dejected. Take to heart the words of Pope John Paul II spoken to the bishops of Boston and Hartford (Conn.): "In a particular way I would ask you to be strongly supportive of your brother priests, many of whom have suffered deeply because of the muchpublicized failings of some of the Church's ministers. I would ask you also to convey my personal gratitude for the generous and selfless service which marks the lives of so many American priests, as well as my deep appreciation of their daily efforts to be models of holiness and pastoral charity in the Christian communities entrusted to their care. In a very real way, the renewal of the Church is linked to the renewal of the priesthood." Certainly, you believe and expect priests to have a unique relationship with God. Otherwise, why else do you ask us day after day, "Father, please pray for me"? Know for sure, this daily prayer is one of the most important things we do, day after day. In return, we rejoice that you treat us as members of your extended families, symbols of the compassionate God you want in your life. So we continue to reach out to all of you ... Would we choose the priesthood again? Speaking, I know, for us in the sanctuary, I say, "Yes, definitely, yes." The priesthood for us has been like a treasure buried in a field. We found it, excitedly sold all we had and bought that field. We have received so much more by exchanging our small human sacrifice for a life of by that we had never dare hope for. We have been blessed by God and by you. I gratefully say, "thank you" and humbly say, "God bless you."
