Spirituality

As a person must be born before he can begin to lead his physical life, so he must be born to lead a Divine Life. That birth occurs in the Sacrament of Baptism. To survive, the person must be nourished by Divine Life; that is done in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. He must grow spiritually and assume his spiritual responsibilities; that is accomplished in the Sacrament of Confirmation. He must heal the wounds of sin; for this there is the Sacrament of Penance. He must wipe out the traces of sin at the end, to prepare for his journey to eternal life; for this there is the Sacrament of Extreme Unction. Man must also prolong and edify the Kingdom of God, for which he is given the Sacrament of Matrimony. He must live under a spiritual government; this *is* provided through the Sacrament of Holy Orders in the Priesthood.

Nature *makes* human nature, but grace *remakes* human nature. Every person who has been born can also

be regenerated, renewed, and revived if he establishes contact with new and divine sources of energy. Christianity puts a high value on human nature, but it does not trust its unaided powers too far. It says that man in his human nature is neither a saint nor a devil; he is neither intrinsically corrupt nor immaculately conceived. He needs divine assistance to perfect this nature. And it is available to him, no matter how wicked he has been in the past; even a man who stoned a martyr like Stephen, as Paul did, can still be saved, not of himself but by the grace of God -as Paul was. And since the new energy and new power to rescue him come from God, it is beside the point for anyone to plead, *"I am not good enough."* Of course not -no person is good enough. But hidden reserves of power are available to anyone who so desires. That was why Our Savior said: ***"Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and you shall find; knock, and it shall be opened to you."*** (Mt 7:7).

Wisdom

General Personal Safety Options

Incidents of violence can occur anywhere at anytime.

Trust your gut feeling that something may be wrong. These are some guidelines that may help reduce potential vulnerability.

Remember though, whether you choose to use the options or not, no one has the right to harm you.

AT HOME:

- 1- Be aware of your surroundings. Be familiar with who is coming and going... who belongs and who doesn't.
- 2- Know your neighbors and learn who can be called for assistance when needed.
- 3- Women may be safer using only first initials and last names on mailboxes and in phone directories.
- 4-Change locks when you move into a new residence. Make sure your doors have deadbolt locks, security chains and peepholes. Use them!
- 5- Don't hide spare keys outdoors.
- 6- Check I.D.s when repair people, salespeople, meter readers, etc. come to the door. Don't hesitate to call and check them out or refuse them admittance if something feels wrong.
- 7- If you let someone in and have second thoughts, be assertive. Tell them to leave or leave yourself. Pretend you are not alone by mentioning a friend or family member asleep in the next room.
- 8- Make sure entrances, garages, grounds and hallways are well-lighted.
- 9- Leave porch lights on at night or when you expect to return after dark. Leave an interior light on in a room or two with the shades down. Leave a radio on.
- 10- Instruct children and baby-sitters not to give out information about who is home, who is out or for how long.
- 11- Don't leave notes on your door for others or allow solicitor's material to remain on your doorknob since they advertise your absence.
- 12- if you suspect your home has been broken into, don't go in or call out. Go someplace else and call the police.
- 13- Always lock doors when doing yard work otherwise spending time in the yard. If you have a portable phone, take it outside with you.
- 14- Be careful using computer internet or online services. Use caution in providing personal information. Being flooded with e-mail can be annoying; having a chat room participant show up at your door uninvited can be terrifying.

IN YOUR CAR:

- 1- Keep car doors locked at all times, and windows rolled up all the way.
- 2- If you have car trouble, raise the hood and stay in your vehicle. If someone offers assistance, roll the window down just enough to talk to them. Ask them to stop at the first phone to call police for you.
- 3- Do not stop to help a stranger in a stalled vehicle. Go to a safe place and report the stalled vehicle to the police.
- 4- Do not pick up hitchhikers.

Story

The first day of school our professor introduced himself and challenged us to get to know someone we didn't already know. I stood up to look around when a gentle hand touched my shoulder. I turned around to find a wrinkled, little old lady beaming up at me with a smile that lit up her entire being. She said, "*Hi handsome. My name is Nancy. I'm eighty-seven years old. Can I give you a hug?*"

I laughed and enthusiastically responded, "*Of course you may!*" and she gave me a giant squeeze. "*Why are you in college at such a young, innocent age?*" I asked. She jokingly replied, "*I'm here to meet a rich husband, get married, have a couple of children, and then retire and travel.*"

"*No seriously,*" I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age. "*I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!*" she told me.

After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this "*time machine*" as she shared her wisdom and experience with me.

Over the course of the year, Nancy became a campus icon and easily made friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she reveled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students. She was living it up.

At the end of the semester, we invited Nancy to speak at our football banquet and I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech, she dropped her three by five cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said "*I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whiskey is killing me! I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know.*"

As we laughed, she cleared her throat and began: "*We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old because we stop playing. There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy, and achieving success.*"

1- "*You have to laugh and find humor every day.*"

2- "*You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it!*"

3- "*There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up. If you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for one full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. If I am eighty-seven years old and stay in bed for a year and never do anything I will turn eighty-eight. Anybody can grow older. That doesn't take any talent or ability. The idea is to grow up by always finding the opportunity in change.*"

4- "*Have no regrets. The elderly usually don't have regrets for what we did, but rather for things we did not do. The only people who fear death are those with regrets.*"

She concluded her speech by courageously singing "*The Rose.*" She challenged each of us to study the lyrics and live them out in our daily lives. At the year's end Nancy finished the college degree she had begun all those years ago.

One week after graduation Nancy died peacefully in her sleep. Over two thousand college students attended her funeral in tribute to the wonderful woman who taught by example that it's never too late to be all you can possibly be.
