Wisdom: Safety Tips for Women #3

Learn to Dial *677

I knew about the red light on cars, but not the *677. It was about 1:00 p.m. in the afternoon, and Lauren was driving to visit a friend. An UNMARKED police car pulled up behind her and put his lights on.

Lauren's parents have always told them never to pull over for an unmarked car on the side of the road, but rather to wait until they get to a gas station, etc.

Lauren had actually listened to her parents advice, and promptly called *677 on her cell phone to tell the police dispatcher that she would not pull over right away. She proceeded to tell the dispatcher that there was an unmarked police car with a flashing red light on his rooftop behind her. The dispatcher checked to see if there were police cars where she and there weren't, and he told her to keep driving, remain calm and that he had back up already on the way.

Ten minutes later 4 cop cars surrounded her and the unmarked car behind her. One policeman went to her side and the others surrounded the car behind. They pulled the guy from the car and tackled him to the ground. The man was a convicted rapist and wanted for other crimes.

I never knew about the *677 Cell Phone Feature, but especially for a woman alone in a car, you should not pull over for an unmarked car.

Apparently police have to respect your right to keep going to a safe and quiet place. You obviously need to make some signals that you acknowledge them (i.e. put on your hazard lights) or call *677 like Lauren did.

Too bad the cell phone companies don't generally give you this little bit of wonderful information.

Speaking to a service representative at **Bell** Mobility confirmed that *677 was a direct link to State Police Dispatch. So, now it's your turn to let your friends know about *677.

Tell this o every person you know; it may save a life.

Story

What kind of family refuses the offer of spiritual intervention for their crippled daughter, Anne? A very rare and selfless one, as it turns out. "We had offered to make a novena to our foundress, Mother Leonie, on several occasions. But the Smith family turned it down. Mother Leonie was a co-founder of a religious order that eventually spread its charitable work to Europe, South Africa, and Ecuador. She died on January 10, 1914, leaving the precept: "Let us work for the happiness of others."

"The nuns approached us several times about the novena, said Mrs. Smith. "But until the third surgery, we felt that there was always hope. We felt that there was another child in much worse condition than our daughter and it would be selfish to deprive another family who had no hope."

Anne was suffering from tethered spinal cord syndrome, a rare condition in which the base of the spine is shredded into tethers and the presence of fatty tumors prevents the spinal cord from keeping pace with the growth of the spine. The condition first presented itself when Anne was ten. She was referred to a neurosurgeon, who believed that once the tumors were removed the pain would end. The surgery, which was supposed to last four hours, took almost seven. Things were much worse than originally thought. The tumors had grown intertwined with her nerves. Her agony continued.

Along with the physical pain came the social isolation that kids often experience from their peers. "The kids weren't overtly mean," one of the nuns said, "but Anne wasn't included in many of the normal activities." With a laugh, Anne recalls, "When I couldn't go to school, one of the nuns would bring me 'important' files to work on. That made me feel worthwhile and useful. It wasn't until years later I discovered it was just busy work to keep my morale up."

But there was precious little laughter as the condition worsened. "There was never a moment that I didn't feel pain to some degree, Anne remembers. After two initial surgeries, the pain resumed. Anne began high school in 1990. A year later, a third surgery was performed. After this operation, she was not even able to make it to physical therapy. When the family visited the doctor, they went expecting to hear plans for a fourth surgery. "He asked Anne to leave the room. Mrs Smith said, "The doctor told us that our daughter was a surgical failure. He referred us to a pain specialist because Anne was going to be bedridden and in chronic pain for the rest of her life. Paralysis was also a concern. In fact, the doctors were amazed that she could still feel her legs at this point."

Anne was devastated. "I needed my parents for everything now," she said, "to help me walk, to get dressed. I used to cry at night, asking someone up there to make me better. When that didn't happen, my faith and belief in God were really gone."

One particular piece of bad news was like a dagger in the heart for Anne. She would never dance again. Dancing meant the world to her. During her darkest hour, a ray of divine light came shining through. One of the nuns approached the Smith again with the novena proposal. "It's time we storm heaven," she told them. This time the family accepted the offer.

The pastor was conducting evening adoration and benediction. "We placed noven cards in the church pews ahead of time," says the pastor. The prayer effort spread to a wider audience beyond the parish. Novena booklets were distributed to every student in the girls and the adjoining boys' high schools. The novena ended up involving more than two—thousand people.

In order for a person to be canonized a Catholic saint, two miracles credited to the intercession of the holy person must be verified. In 1991, Pope John Paul II proclaimed Mother Leonie's first miracle, when she was credited with saving the severely burned and infected right arm of Vincent Kesner, a South African boy, in 1976. Now the people in this suburb were praying for a second miracle.

Confined to bed, Anne fervently prayed for Mother Leonie's intercession. But things got worse before they got better. "The night before the miracle I was up all night in the worst pain I ever experienced," Anne says. "Later on, I found out that many recipients of miracles experience their worst agony right before the healing."

The next day, was the last day of the novena. Anne was left alone while her parents and four siblings were busy elsewhere. Anne has no memory of anything from ten o'clock in the morning until two in the afternoon that day. "When I came to, I didn't feel any pain," Anne said. Contrary to what one might expect, the fourteen-year-old was not overwhelmed. "When the novena started, everything changed for me. It wasn't a matter of if but when I would get better," said Anne.

She started walking around in circles and then throughout the house. When her parents returned home, they were shocked. That night, Anne had dinner with her family and then washed the dishes—simple acts which many take for granted, but extraordinary ones for a person whose life had been a prison of pain.

Word began to get out. Anne's parents called the nun. "It was an overwhelming sense of the awesome power of prayer when I heard of the miracle," sister said, "When people join together, prayers can be answered." When Mrs. Smith called the high school to tell them Anne would be returning, the news swept forth like a tidal wave, eventually making its way to the Vatican. It looked as if Anne's miracle would be the one that moved Mother Leonie from "Blessed" to "Saint."

After significant scientific study and theological review, the review board made its recommendation to the pope. Then on December 18, 2000, Pope John Paul II declared Anne's cure a miracle. Anne said, "I went from asking, 'Why me? Why am I sick?' to "How much can I give back?" She did a lot of traveling and missionary work. At age nineteen, she worked in an impoverished town in Mexico, teaching and distributing clothes and repairing homes. For two years she also worked with tribes in San Fidel, New Mexico, teaching career development and sign language. Anne has gone on to get her bachelor's and master's degrees. On

September 14, 2001, she married and danced at her wedding. Today, she delights in telling the story of her miracle, and spreading a message of faith and hope.

A Time to Laugh (118)

Just pointing them in the right direction

Two priests and a bishop died one day and were outside the gates of heaven waiting to get in.

Saint Peter checked his records and said, "I'm sorry gentlemen, but it looks like it will be a while before you can go in."
